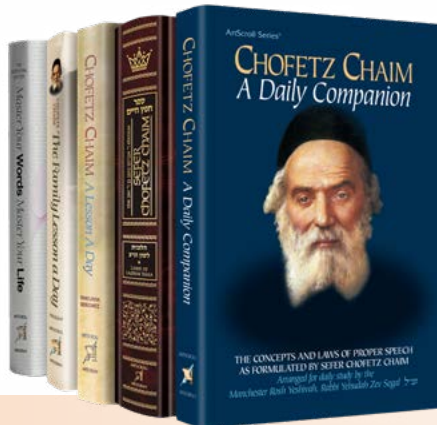

We Both Need to Make This Kabbalah

I have a close friend, Yehudah, whom I've known since kindergarten.

We're in yeshivah together and learn together during night seder, and we're part of the same circle of friends. That means we have lots of opportunities to shmooze.

Sometimes we get into pretty deep conversations, and one thing we've been talking about is trying to really



grow in Torah and *middos* this coming year. We decided to ask our rebbi about choosing a good *kabbalah*. We discussed learning *hilchos Shabbos* or a *sefer* on *tefillah*. But then I said, "Maybe we should learn *hilchos loshon hora*. We're definitely not as careful as we should be." After I said this, I thought, *Maybe I shouldn't have included Yehudah in my statement*. Was what I said okay?

What's the Psak?

Do you know the halachah?

A Yes.

The result will not harm Yehudah; it will help him improve.

It's *loshon hora* about Yehudah.

Keep it Neutral

It's great that Yehudah and Yoni see the new year as an opportunity to grow! But, in his choosing of the *kabbalah*, Yoni made a common mistake. People think that since their relatives and close friends are so much a part of them, they can speak about them negatively.¹ It's as if there's no difference between saying "My allergies annoy me," and "My brother annoys me."

Not only is this a mistake, it is the opposite of the truth. Those who mean the most to us are the ones we should be most careful not to hurt.

Yoni also may have thought that including himself in the statement makes it kosher. This is also not true. It's okay for Yoni to tell his rebbi that *he* has a challenge regarding *loshon hora*, but he cannot include Yehudah in that admission.² Instead,

he should have said something like, "How about working on *loshon hora*? That's something we all need *chizuk* in."

However, Yoni *is* on the right track in his suggestion to learn the halachos, because that will help him avoid these and other mistakes in the future. And the best, most effective way to ingrain these halachos into our minds and hearts is to join Shmiras Haloshon Yomi and learn the halachos every day—a *kabbalah* that will fill this new year with positivity and peace.

Answer: The halachah is B.
